

Notes on Editors

Lorenzo De Sio is an Assistant Professor at LUISS Guido Carli—Rome where he teaches “Methods of social research” (in English) and “Public opinion and political behaviour” (in Italian). He is the coordinator of the CISE (Italian Centre for Electoral Studies). Formerly a Jean Monnet Fellow at the European University Institute; a Visiting Research Fellow at the University of California, Irvine; and a Campbell National Fellow at Stanford University, he is a member of the Scientific Council of the ITANES (Italian National Election Studies), and he takes part to the “True European Voter” and “EUandI” international research projects. Before LUISS, he has taught at the universities of Florence and Siena. His current research interests revolve around spatial and nonspatial models of voting behaviour and party competition, with regard to the role of issues. Among his publications are articles appearing on *Comparative Political Studies*, *West European Politics*, *South European Society and Politics*, as well as on all the main relevant Italian scientific journals. He is the author of *Elettori in movimento* (Polistampa, 2008) and *Competizione e spazio politico* (Il Mulino, 2011), the editor of *La politica cambia, i valori restano? Una ricerca sulla cultura politica dei cittadini toscani* (Firenze University Press, 2011), the coeditor of *Terremoto elettorale. Le elezioni politiche del 2013* (Il Mulino, 2014), of *The Italian general election of 2013: A dangerous stalemate?* (CISE, 2013), and of the first four volumes in Italian of the *Dossier CISE* series.

Vincenzo Emanuele has received his PhD in Political Science at Scuola Normale Superiore (formerly SUM) of Florence defending a thesis on the process of vote nationalisation in Western Europe and its determinants. Previously, he has graduated in Political Science at the University of Florence and has been subject expert in Italian Political System at LUISS Guido Carli in Rome. Today, he teaches Italian Political System at Middlebury College (Florence), and he is a member of CISE (Italian Center for Electoral Studies). He has published articles on *Meridiana - Rivista di Storia e Scienze Sociali* and on *Quaderni dell'Osservatorio Elettorale*.
